

Bikes in Transit

Metro operates the St. Louis metropolitan region's public transportation system — a multi-modal system that includes MetroBus and Metrolink light rail, as well as Metro A-Ride paratransit system. Metro fare is purchased aboard MetroBus; exact cash fare is required. Current passes or validated tickets are required on Metrolink. To validate your pass or ticket, use a red Validating Machine located at each Metrolink platform. Simply insert your pass or ticket into the slot at the top of the red post.

All Metro fare types can be purchased at the MetroRide Transit Store located at the corner of 7th and Washington, Downtown St. Louis. In addition, several Metro fare types can be purchased at select vendor locations, or at Ticket Vending Machines (TVMs) conveniently located at each Metrolink station.

You can use Metro's new TripFinder at www.tripfinder.metrostlouis.org to review timetables and locate bus stops.

HOW TO TRANSPORT YOUR BIKE ON METROLINK

MetroLink is the perfect way to extend your bike trip. Board with your bike at any MetroLink station during normal hours of operation. Please note: if trains are too crowded, bike may be prohibited.

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THE BIKE CARRIERS ARE EASY TO USE. JUST FOLLOW THESE STEPS:

1. Alert the bus operator that you need to lower the bicycle carrier. Lower the carrier rack with one hand while holding your bike with the other hand. Simply grasp the rack handle, squeeze it and pull forward until the rack is completely lowered.
2. Lift the bike into either of the carrier's wheel wells. If your bicycle is the first one on the carrier, place it in the position nearest to the bus. The placement of the front wheel is clearly shown in writing on the rack. All sizes of single-rider bikes will fit.
3. With the bike sitting in the rack, raise the locking arm and pull it up over the front tire of the bike.

HOW TO TRANSPORT YOUR BIKE ON METROBUS

Bicycle carriers are available on the front of MetroBus on routes in the City of St. Louis. Bicycles can be placed on the bicycle carrier during the normal hours of operation and can accommodate two bicycles at a time. You must be at least 13 years old to use a bicycle carrier, unless you are accompanied by an adult.



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3. With the bike sitting in the rack, raise the locking arm and pull it up over the front tire of the bike.

The only point of contact between the carrier and the bike is the rubber tire. Make sure your bike is secured properly: the locking arm should be at the 10 o'clock or 2 o'clock position the front tire depending on which way the bicycle is facing.

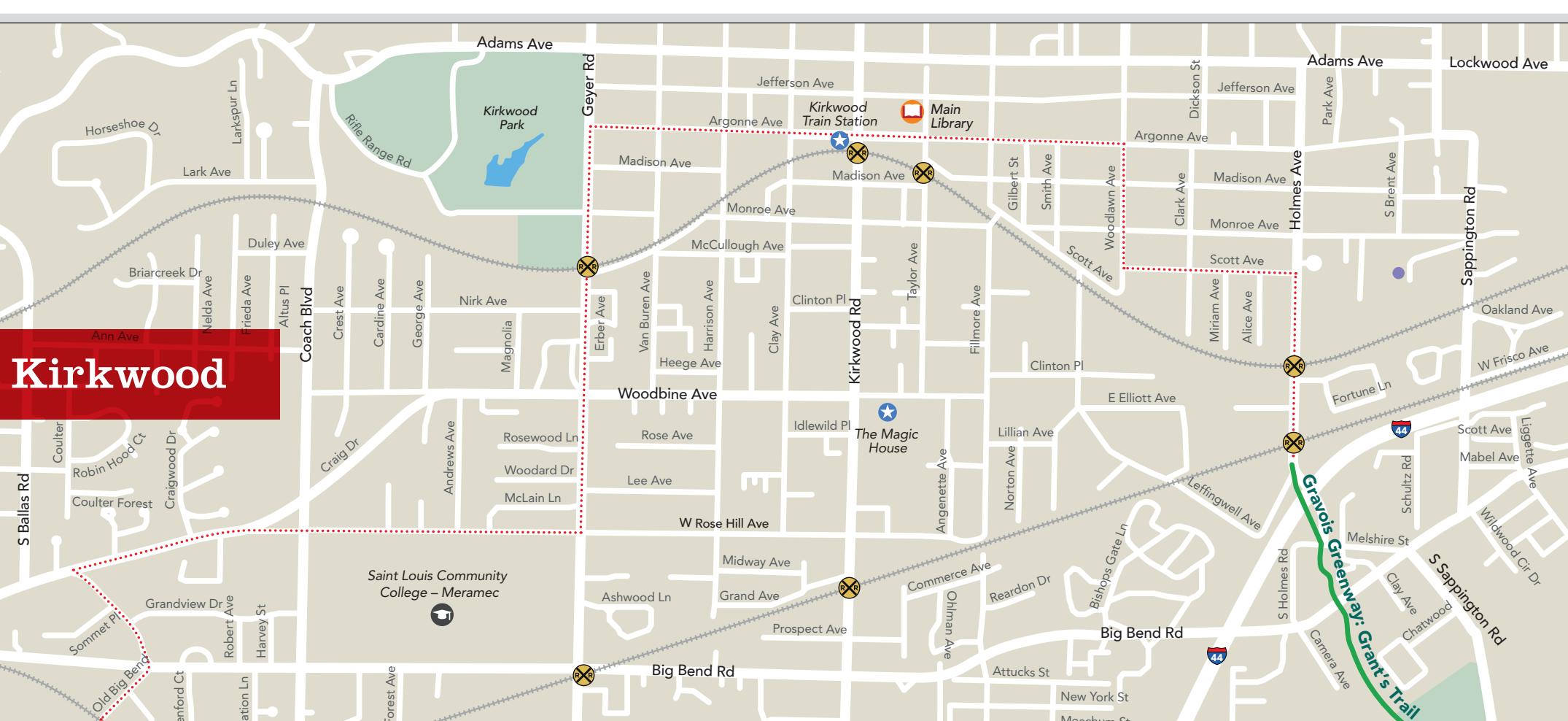
4. Board the bus and sit as close to the front as possible so you can keep your bike in view.
5. At your stop, let the bus operator know you will be unloading your bike from the front of the bus and exit. If no other bikes are in the carrier, return it to its upright position.

Google Maps

Google Maps makes trip planning quick and easy. Simply enter where you are, where you want to go, and select the bicycle icon. Google Maps will plan your route for you. 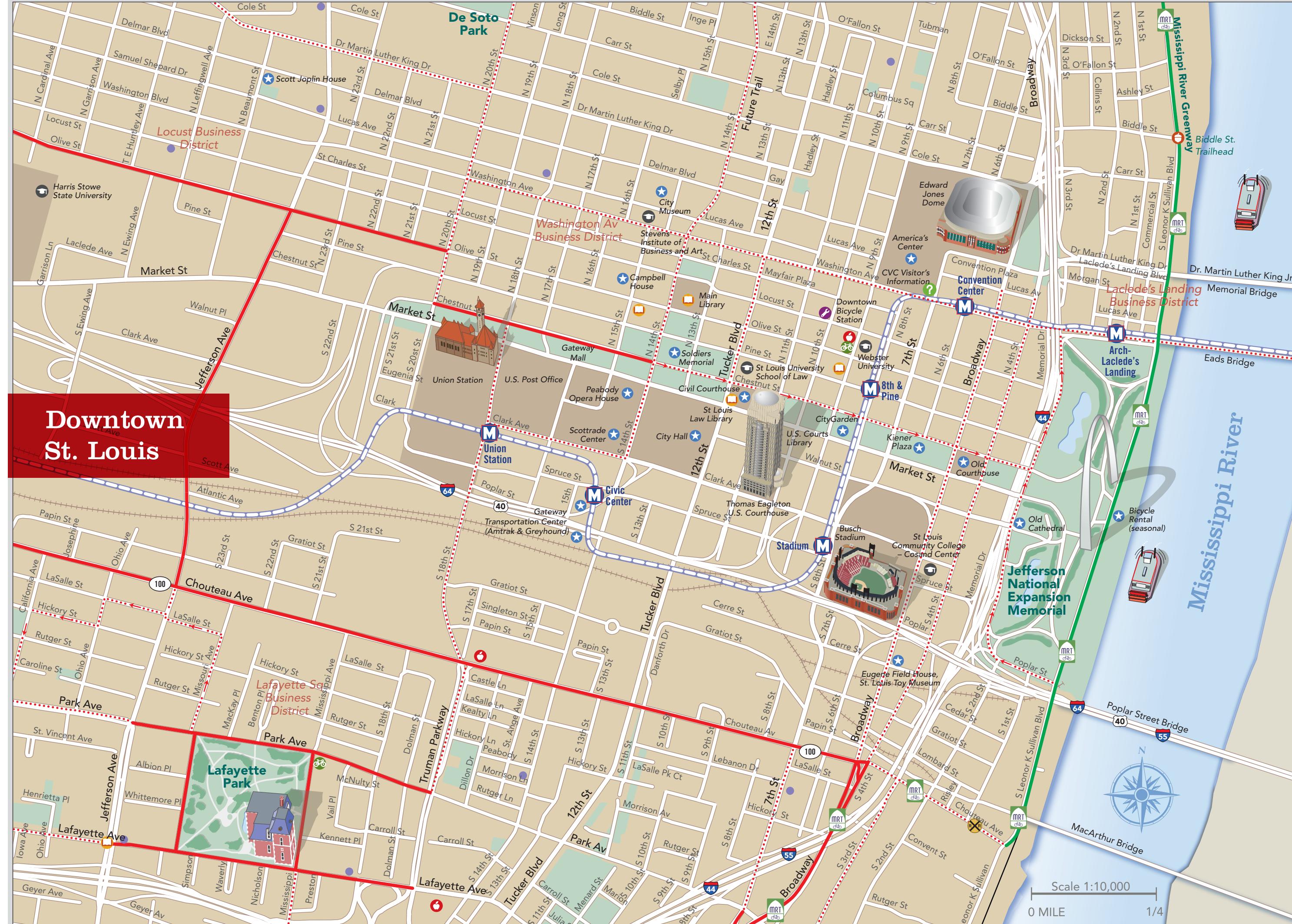
Explore St. Louis

Theft Prevention

Most bicycle thefts are due to unlocked or improperly locked bikes. Following these tips will help prevent your bicycle from being stolen:

- Never leave your bike unlocked, not even for a second.
- Always use a high quality U-lock or chain. For added security, use both.
- Always lock the frame and front wheel to either a bicycle rack or pole. (See illustration 1).
- For extra security, remove the front wheel and lock it with the frame and rear wheel. (See illustration 2).
