or sixteen years, we have been building and bringing to life a network of greenways in St. Louis County and St. Charles
County. Working with citizens and partners, we are literally and figuratively knitting our fragmented region together. With these connections comes better understanding — and a greater opportunity to bridge some of the divides that beset our region.

2016 was a significant year for us. Not only did we successfully complete our regional plan update (as we do every five years), we worked with our partners to leverage sixteen years of experience to develop best practices for citizen engagement, level-of-care guidelines and interpretive standards to increase our impact.

At the core of these efforts are the people we serve: citizens, civic leaders,

stakeholders and partners. During our regional plan update process, you helped us clearly define the implementation strategies and action plans that will guide our efforts to ensure the long-term success of the greenways for years to come.

How can we best sum up 2016? It was a year of progress, planning and partnerships

In June, we celebrated the 1.5 mile extension of the Mississippi Greenway and improvements to Leonor K. Sullivan Blvd. as part of the larger CityArchRiver project. People from all corners of the region came together for a community picnic—complete with a 2016 foot picnic table along the mighty Mississippi River.

Our 2016 planning efforts prepared the way for 6.8 miles of new greenway and 3 bridges ready to break ground in the first quarter of 2017 alone; the Mississippi Greenway in Cliff Cave County Park; River des Peres Greenway from Shrewsbury Lansdowne MetroLink Station to Francis R. Slay Park, Centennial Greenway Bridges over 364 and 94, and the Fee Fee Greenway from McKelvey Woods to Creve Coeur County Park.

Planning for Chouteau Greenway gained momentum alongside other development within the central corridor of St. Louis City, which will eventually connect Forest Park to the Gateway Arch. We'll take the first step on this project when the Boyle MetroLink Station in the Cortex Innovation Community breaks ground in 2017.

2016 was also the year we launched the Great Rivers Greenway

Foundation. Our aim is to seek private funding for projects through donations, grants and events that will maximize

and expand the use of tax dollars for transformational projects and for areas of greatest need. We are eager to expand on these efforts as we build a community of people to support and enjoy the greenways!

The CityArchRiver Project: Partner & Steward



The CityArchRiver project is a \$380 million public-private partnership that will make St. Louis' beloved Gateway Arch easier and safer for everyone to experience by connecting, invigorating and expanding the park's grounds and museums. The project connects the Gateway Arch grounds with downtown and the riverfront, where locals and tourists alike will find new opportunities to learn, linger and enjoy one of the world's most recognized icons.

We're **1 of 6** partners in the CityArchRiver Alliance:















We steward \$85 million in bonded Proposition P funds for the taxpayers in St. Louis City & County. At the end of 2016, \$70.3 million of the \$85 million for construction of CityArchRiver projects on the Arch grounds and \$5.2 million of the \$12 million for construction of Kiener Plaza had been spent or committed to contracts.

1,873 contacts in the regional construction industry

in the regional construction industry invited to pre-bid meetings to learn and form collaborative teams to bid.

51% of all

construction dollars on the riverfront project awarded to disadvantaged business enterprises, plus 14.7% minority workforce participation.
